SPECIAL PERMITS - CONDITIONS

Special permits under Article 89(1)(b) of the Licensing (Jersey) Law are issued subject to the following conditions

1. Intoxicating liquor shall not be supplied to persons under the influence of alcohol or to police officers in uniform.
2. Intoxicating liquor shall not be supplied to a person under the age of 18 nor shall such a person be permitted to consume intoxicating liquor.
3. No debauchery or drunkenness shall be permitted.
4. No unlawful gambling shall be permitted.
5. No person under the age of eighteen years shall be employed to work in connection with any bar.

GUIDELINES FOR CONDUCT IN RELATION TO SPECIAL PERMITS ISSUED UNDER ARTICLE 89(1)(b) OF THE LICENSING (JERSEY) LAW, 1974

1. A special permit permits the holder of a licence to sell intoxicating liquor at particular times or at a particular place specified in the permit. It does not permit liquor to be sold by anyone else.
2. The holder of a licence who has obtained a special permit, or the manager where appropriate, is responsible for supervising the sale of intoxicating liquor at the event in question. He should exercise adequate supervision so as to ensure that the conditions attached to the permit are complied with.
3. The holder of the licence (or the manager where appropriate) should ensure that all those involved with the serving of intoxicating liquor are made aware of their responsibilities and of the conditions attached to the permit.

Holders of a licence are reminded that failure to comply with these guidelines may lead the Attorney General to refer the matter to the Licensing Assembly under Article 9 of the Licensing (Jersey) Law, 1974.
