May I start with a personal and professional apology for being the focal point of this media story and for the inevitable challenge this will now bring to resourcing the final stages of procurement.

As discussed with Kirsten last night, I wish to recuse myself from any further involvement in the live procurement so as to protect the integrity of any eventual decision by government and also my own professional reputation. As we have not yet reached the stage of tabling a formal recommendation for Ministers to consider I do not consider there to be any fundamental harm to the process and, in any event, I have not fulfilled any of the bid evaluator roles and any final decision is for Ministers rather than officials.

- The official has consistently pursued islanders best interests in dealing with a range of particularly challenging matters on our sea connectivity in the past 12 months.
- To protect the integrity of any eventual decision, the official has voluntarily recused himself from any further involvement in the procurement process and a new SRO will be appointed.
